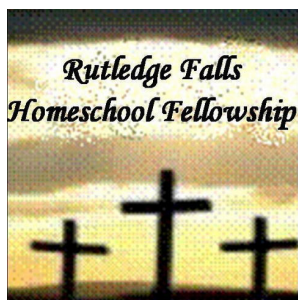

Class Descriptions

Non-Rotating Classes

We are glad to keep your little ones occupied and happy while you and your older children enjoy our co-op day. You are welcome to volunteer your time to help supervise these young children, but we would like you to spend some time getting acquainted with other co-op members as well.

Nursery – For children from birth to toddling ages. Cribs and rocking chairs available for naptime, and favorite free-play toys welcome. Leader: Bethany Cope. No class fee.

Playgroup – For children who are walking but not yet potty-trained. This roomful of love will keep your little ones occupied and happy at free play while you and your older children enjoy our co-op day. Leader: Leah Leblond. No class fee.

Three-year-old Class – For children who are potty-trained but not ready to prepare for kindergarten level work. Please join us for a day full of love, snacks, playdough, painting, show-n-tell time, crafts, puzzles, large-motor PE, and lots of FUN!!!! Teacher: Brandy Skipper. Class Fee: \$5.

PreKindergarten / Kindergarten – For children who are working on their pre-reading skills. We will be working on phonics, scissors skills, counting, colors and shapes, and other fine motor skills while having fun playing!! Hope to see you there! Teacher: Bonnie Steele. Class Fee: \$5.

Rotating Classes

Adopt a Pet for a Week

Grades 1 through 6

We will learn the basics of knitting socks on double pointed needles and complete at least one simple pair of socks. For supplies everyone needs to have a set (5) of size 2 double pointed needles and at least 400 yards of sock yarn. A ruler also is a good idea. For some sock yarns the 400 yd will be in one skein and for others you will need to purchase two skeins. Just be sure and check the label.
